Aristotle also strongly and severely criticized Plato's views on the prohibition of property over the guard class because a person by his nature cares only about what he personally possesses and benefits him, as well as provoking hatred and conflict in The souls of citizens, and he also rejected the idea of women's communism because saying the communism of women and the resulting communism of children descends into the human family to the level of the families of cows and horses, and makes every citizen unable to determine where his son is and where his brother or father is.
